Administration's (NTIA) inquiry regarding the Internet of Things (IoT).

Megan L Brown, a partner in the firm's Telecom, Media & Technology Practice, and Umair Javed, an associate in the Practice, submitted the comments to NTIA on behalf of CATI. In the comments, the Chamber urged NTIA to approach IoT issues through a multistakeholder process.

The Chamber also recommended steps to help policymakers promote IoT while appropriately addressing challenges and ensuring broader goals. "IoT represents the next evolution of the Internet and mobility," the Chamber said in the comments. "Much like the Internet's earlier phases, IoT will flourish under a flexible, non-regulatory policy regime."
